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SENATOR McCAIN ALREADY PUSHING NEEDLE TOWARD POSITIVE

Phoenix, Arizona, June 1, 2015. As the 2016 election approaches and after U.S. Senator John McCain aggressively announced his re-election campaign plans, voters, and especially Republicans, seem to be responding favorably. Job ratings for Arizona's Senior U.S. Senator grew to 30 percent favorable in the May 2015 poll from 27 percent in April of 2014. Simultaneously negative job ratings subsided to 26 percent from 31 percent in the same period. This is a net favorable shift of eight percentage points.

Suggestions that the Senator may be vulnerable in next year's GOP primary election may be premature as the Senator has a reputation for knowing how to win elections, will by all reports have more than enough money to back up his campaign skills and is already showing important improvements in his job rating, especially among GOP voters he must win to his cause in the all important GOP primary election in 2016. In addition, GOP campaign strategists have shown proficiency in recent years in the techniques for obliterating the reputations of opponents to their candidates. In any event, there can be no doubt that Senator McCain will be no pushover. Today, 49 percent of Republicans rated his work favorably while 32 percent were negative in their assessments.

To be sure, Democrat, Congresswoman Ann Kirkpatrick's announcement last week that she plans to challenge for Senator McCain's seat may cast a different light on the race. She is a high-profile office-holder who has withstood some rough campaigns for her House seat.

The findings outlined in this reports are based on a statewide survey of 701 adult heads of household including 457 registered voters. It was conducted between April 29 and May 10, 2015 by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is part of the Center's Independent and non-

While Senator McCain's numbers among GOP voters are improved, it should be recalled that just over half still have questions about his performance that result in them giving him less than unambiguous positive ratings. Additionally, if he makes it through his primary election, he will face Independent and Democrat voters who appear increasingly less likely to vote for him. Thus, job ratings among Independents are 40 percent negative to 21 percent favorable and among Democrats, the ratings are 36 percent negative to only 19 percent favorable. Senator McCain has improved also in his appeal to Hispanic voters who are likely to be major players in the 2016 elections.

U.S. Senator Jeff Flake appears to have done little to expand the percentage of Arizonans who think he is doing a good job in Washington. Today, just a fifth of Arizonans are willing to classify his performance as "good" while 16 percent rate him as doing a poor job. Fully a third are holding back on making any assessment. In all fairness, however, we register a steady and significant decline in the proportion who considers Senator Flake's performance to be "poor". That percent has declined from a high of 30 percent in the summer of 2013 to only 16 percent today. The most dramatic decrease in negative scores comes from within the ranks of Democrats among whom 41 percent rated his performance as poor last April, but today only 27 percent hold that view.

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EDITOR'S NOTE: This Rocky Mountain Poll - Arizona (2015-II-03), is based on 701 interviews with heads of household statewide including 457 registered voters, conducted between April 29 and May 10, 2015. Interviewing was conducted in English or Spanish by professional interviewers of the Behavior Research Center on both land lines and cell phones. Where necessary, figures for age, sex, and race were weighted to bring them into line with their actual proportion in the population. In a sample of this size, one can say with a 95 percent certainty that the results have a statistical precision of plus or minus 3.8 percent of what they would have been had the entire adult population been surveyed and 4.7 percent had the entire voter population been surveyed. The Rocky Mountain Poll is conducted by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona and is an independent and non-partisan research program sponsored by the Center.
